# GIVING Jim Turrent LEAD PASTOR

sk most pastors what they least like to talk about and most would put giving near the top of the list. We are hugely sensitive to the criticism of being too interested in money. Yet the Lord Jesus taught that our attitude to money is indicative of the condition of our hearts, He said:

"Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (MATTHEW 6:21).

Our giving should reflect God's amazing grace to us and be an act of worship (Colossians 3:17). Paul told the Corinthians that giving should be regular, realistic and proportionate to their income (1 Corinthians 16:1–2). He also tells the Corinthians (2 Corinthians 8) that the Macedonian believers gave out of their "poverty", demonstrating sacrificial Spirit-generated giving. Our giving is to be between ourselves and God (Matthew 6:3). A minimal number of people in Central know what is being given – and no pastors do!

God promises blessing to those who give in the above way. Jesus said:

Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 CORINTHIANS 9:6–7).

Prosperity hucksters have twisted this truth to excite greed and rip people off, but Jesus' words remain true. The blessing we receive may not be financial – but something more valuable – a heart less inclined to the idolatry of wealth.

Wealth is not sinful. God blesses. But the more we have the harder it is to give! The story is told of a man at a gospel meeting who gave his testimony about giving his last pound to God and that God had blessed his business abundantly. As he sat down a wee woman behind him whispered in his ear "Do it again!".

Let's pray, give and enjoy this participation in God's work!

Gift Aid is a Government scheme that allows charities to claim back any income tax paid on the amount given, so you must pay income tax for this to be a viable option. For example: if you give £100, Central is able to claim an additional £25 back from the Government at no additional cost to you.

Since we moved to the new charity status of a SCIO as Central Baptist Church Dundee, all previous gift aid forms are now invalid. If you have completed a Gift Aid form in the past and have not completed a new one yet (and you are still a taxpayer) please complete a new form.

# **INTERVIEW WITH** KATHRYN WRIGHT

#### What is the 'Leader-in-Training' scheme?

The role is similar to the Pastor-in-Training scheme and is designed to equip women for serving in church-based ministry roles, for



example chaplaincy and pastoral work, Bible teaching and discipleship/ mentoring, while undertaking degree-level theological education. While the apprenticeship position is one with the aim of aiding discernment for those considering a future in Christian ministry, the LIT role is a 3-4-year position designed for the focused leadership training of those, who in partnership with their church, have discerned a call to a specific area of ministry. For me, this is to be focused training on ministry among seniors within the church and also chaplaincy work within care home settings.

#### What has most impacted you over the last year of training?

God is good, His faithfulness shines through the lives of many of our senior's, some of whom can recount 80+ years of walk with Christ. The testimonies of God's working in these lives has profoundly affected my own faith.

#### What are you most excited about as this next phase of ministry begins?

It's definitely been a steep learning curve over the past year, but also an extraordinary experience as I've had opportunities to lead Bible studies, care home services, prayer meetings, to build relationships with some of the older members of our church family, and to share the love and word of God in some hard places. As I have grown during this time, so has this area of ministry and so I'm excited to see where the Lord is taking me and this area of service.


#### How can we support you in this new role?

I am deeply grateful for the prayers of my church family, and so as I move forward I would value prayers for my own walk of faith, for the growing opportunities to share Jesus within care homes, and for the Lord's provision and equipping as I continue studying and serving Him here. Above all else, I would ask for your prayers that both this training and this ministry would be a blessing to the church here and a way for the gospel to be shared.




ur student ministry is relaunching as Students & Young Adults in the new time slot of Sunday afternoon/early evening - starting October 2nd.

The above is what I read on the 10ofThose website as I searched for a resource that might help support what we do at Club Central in the coming session. Those with a keen eye will

have picked out the key word 'explorer', which of course resonated with me with our Holiday Club having the theme Polar Explorers! I have ordered a pack and will see if it fits the bill!

On our website Club Central is described as:

"primarily an opportunity for relationship building through fun and food. Primary age children come and enjoy games, craft, snack and a short talk with a Christian message."

Over the past few years the building relationships aspect of Club Central has been fairly successful. This session our prayer is that the Christian message part would have a more prominent role. Many of our children have been 'fishers of kids' as they have invited school friends, neighbours and relatives along to Club Central. As we were reminded at our Holiday Club, you are 'Never Too Young' to be used by God. I can remember a little girl with no church background coming to Central with Rosie and Cameron, who were members of Central at the time. They had befriended their neighbour and suggested little Molly came with them to church. When Rosie and Cameron emigrated to the USA another family in the area, who were friends of Molly's

parents, stepped in and continued to bring Molly.

Although her parents had no interest in Christianity, Molly kept coming to Central and made good friends with Central kids. She became a Christian, was baptised as a teenager, served in missions in Scotland and South Africa and eventually left Dundee to study in Glasgow. I heard when she was at University she continued her mission trips, this time to Mexico. Now in her twenties, as far as I know, Molly continues to follow Jesus.

Let's pray that through Club Central, other Children's Ministries and the witness of our youngsters that many more 'little Mollys' will come to faith.

### **MISSIONARY SUPPORT GROUP**

ELDER AND CHAIR OF CENTRAL'S MISSIONARY SUPPORT GROUP

n Matthew 28:18b–20 Jesus says "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go

therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you."

The Great Commission gives us the command from Jesus to make disciples of all nations and as a church that is what we want to be part of. As a church we are committed to supporting people who are called by God to serve Him in other countries and praying for missionaries across the world, who are helping to bring people to know Jesus.

CBC supports missionaries who are serving God in different parts of the world, in the Arabian Gulf, Peru, Europe and with Chinese diaspora in the UK. The Missionary Support Group (MSG) is the key connection between our missionaries and CBC, where we aim to update the church family on their news, to highlight key prayer points and to understand how we can support them in the best way possible as they seek to expand God's kingdom.

As a group, the MSG meet monthly, either in person or on Zoom, to pray for our missionaries, to consider how we can be supporting them in different ways, how we can be communicating their news to the church and highlight that we are part of a global family in Christ and how, as a church, we can be supporting and praying Christians across the world.

As well as longer-term missionaries, CBC has also supported people going on short-term mission and although short-term mission trips were generally stopped over Covid, there are many opportunities opening up now, so if this is something you are interested in, please let us know!

Through the year there are some key times in the church in which there is a greater focus on overseas mission: at the end of January we have a mission weekend, where the emphasis is the importance of overseas mission and making God's word known across the nations; in September we celebrate harvest and do this through promoting the work of a gospel-centred organisation who work with people groups in need; and in November we remember the suffering church and pray for our brothers and sisters across the world who are persecuted because of their faith.

The MSG is currently made of seven people, but if this is a ministry you would like to find out more about being involved with, or if you are interested in supporting our missionaries and receiving regular news, please contact Matt Lock at mission@centraldundee.com.



Harvest is a time when we remember God's goodness to us. At CBC we choose to do this through supporting overseas mission work through a partner organisation. ### WAYNE AND MIRIAM COWPLAND UPDATE

i Friends, we have enjoyed a slower pace over the summer, although that still involved two trips to Switzerland and the usual weekly routine of Zoom meetings. Now as we move into Autumn the pace really picks up! We have a retreat coming up soon with the rest of our Area Team for Europe, to look ahead to the next 3 years and give vision and strategy for the work of WEC in Europe. We want to reach people who are coming to Europe from all over the world, including some of the hardest-to-reach people groups, but we also want to see a vibrant church re-established among indigenous Europeans. And we want to see those churches grasp a real missions vision and send out workers to the ends of the earth!

At the end of September we will be in Italy with our team who are reaching out to migrants in Turin, and then in October we visit Portugal, where we have a team partnering with local churches to reach into the north of



Portugal where there are very few evangelical Christians. Please pray that we will be able to encourage the workers in both these places, and that the Lord will give us the right devotional messages to share with them.

Every 4 years WEC holds a leadership conference for all its leaders around the world, so in November we will be going to Chiang Mai in Thailand for this conference. We both have several plenary sessions which we are responsible for, and together we will be presenting a review of the work of

WEC over the past 4 years, including the impact of the pandemic. Pray that God would give us His insights and wisdom as we prepare these presentations. There will be around 300 leaders at this conference. On our way back to the UK we plan to spend a few days in Singapore to close up our bank accounts and say a proper 'goodbye' to our church there. Wayne will preach on the Sunday, which

will be very special, and we will both have the opportunity to thank them for making us feel so at home among them during our 10 years there.

Thank you CBC for continuing to be our spiritual home as we travel so often. We hope to share more about the needs in Europe in the coming months.

Being a student in Belfast he became friends with John Holland, who led a men's Bible Class of over 100 in his church. John encouraged Robert to go to the Bible Training Institute (BTI) in Glasgow.

At Bible College, in an early morning prayer meeting, he heard a young lady pray, which impressed him. He peeped up to see who it was and thought, "If she can pray like that, she would make me a great wife in the service of the Lord". The rest is history!


Returning home Robert became involved in the ministry of his church. During



Eventually arriving at the Port of Callao, Peru, they were met by Jim Elliot's brother Bert, who also was a missionary! What an amazing moment of confirmation that way!

Robert says, "It has been a wonderful privilege serving the Lord in this capacity. It was the best decision of my life". ■

t has been an encouraging start to the new year of youth ministry at Central. This has shown us just how challenging a context the youth are




growing up in, and how much they need Biblical clarity. We intend to incorporate many of these topics in our plan for the year. Please pray for us as we prepare and deliver these sessions.

During my time in Jerusalem, God challenged me through what I saw in the Jewish and Islamic quarters. I saw rituals and worship at the Wailing Wall, where it was disrespectful to turn your back on it. I learned Muslims sealed shut the Golden Gate to prevent the second coming of the Messiah, and similarly buried their dead outside the gate to deter his return too.

A deep sense of sadness fell upon me after seeing this and it revealed to me the need for the true Jesus Christ to be seen in Jerusalem.

I am reminded of Jesus' travels through Samaria in John 4. Asking her for a

drink, the Samaritan woman questions Jesus' choice to associate with her. She was an outcast and sought to satisfy her thirst through worldly pleasures. In verse 13, Jesus tells the woman she won't find satisfaction in the water she drinks now, but to seek the gift of God where she'll never feel thirsty.

Just as this woman had unquenched thirst, so too do the Muslims and some of the Jews of Jerusalem. Please pray for the Promised Land.

This journey was eye opening and clarified their need for our prayer.

Please pray for Jews and Muslims, that they would find the true living water given by Christ that will allow them to be satisfied and free.

we'd appreciate prayer as we seek funding for other equipment, and also because we only have a small team to run the café. Please also pray that as the Project grows, we would retain that distinctive gospel emphasis – we want to see people fed spiritually as well as physically!

The development of the Project has also highlighted again how valuable it would be to be able to do the work on our building, creating a much more welcoming front to the building as well as doing some much-needed updates inside. We're still a long way (around £17,000) from having the funds to be able to make a start, but are trusting in God's provision. Please keep praying with us!




hank you for the opportunity to update you on the work of street chaplains in Dundee City and Broughty Ferry as the city starts to return to normal at night.



the Street Chaplains returned to the streets of Dundee City Centre at the end of August. For various reasons, the team is low in number at the moment with two of the Chaplains usually going out for a few hours on Friday nights.



There has been a variety of responses and some interesting discussions with people this year as we try to share the gospel in the evenings with clubgoers, staff and those passing through the city centre. Making contact is usually by offering tracts, lollies and sweets, and further conversations can lead to opportunities of giving out Bibles and invitations to church.

The chaplains also give out flip flops, water and other aid as opportunity arises with the hope that people will recognise the love of God touching them and respond in a way that pleases God their creator.

Pray for the Chaplains to be faithful, focused and bold as they go out at night, and for people around town to hear, understand and believe the gospel and that God would be glorified in this."

ur vision at SU Scotland is to see every child and young person in Scotland exploring the Bible



and responding to the significance of Jesus. Different wording than Jesus uses in Matthew 28:19–20, but the same sentiment, I think. When I began working for SU Scotland in Dundee and Angus, I felt overwhelmed by the size of the task:

Every child and young person | All nations

Of course, there would be something wrong with us if we didn't feel that way! In our own strength these mission fields are too great, but with God anything is possible and so dependence on him is a core value for us at SU Scotland.

Events of the past years (I refuse to use the dreaded 'P' word again!) saw a complete halt to our schools' work. At a time when children and young people were at their most vulnerable, it was hard to be on the wrong side of a locked door. The time away has also seen faithful volunteers retire or move on. We're so grateful for their service but, as we rebuild, we find ourselves with wide open doors to share the gospel in schools that we cannot walk through owing to lack of people power. Please pray God prompts the right people into this service.

While out of school, however, we've taken full advantage of other opportunities open to us, hosting monthly discipleship Connect Groups and Equip events for secondary pupils, and both day camps and residentials for all ages. Pray God will keep His promise that His word would not return to Him empty, and there would be fruit from this work.

next year to experience more of the fellowship, preaching, teaching, worship and prayer that the convention offers, and more of Keswick town and countryside.




